The History of Jazz

The Jazz genre of music encompasses a wide variety of performances, which includes instrumental and vocal repertoire. Jazz originated in the late 19th and early 20th century in African American communities throughout the United States. It has been hailed as “one of America’s original art forms.” A skilled jazz musician will play a tune in many different ways, and will never play the tune exactly the same way twice. The musician may change the melody, harmony or time signature depending on his/her mood or interactions with other musicians. This musical style is called improvisation - the art of creating a unique, new musical statement on the spur of the moment. When one thinks of jazz, the city of New Orleans and guitarist B.B. King often come to mind.

In vocal jazz, singers may sing the lyrics of a song, or improvise with wordless sounds or nonsense syllables. This technique is referred to as scat singing. This is a difficult technique in which the voice becomes the instrument, improvising melodies and rhythms.

Blues is another type of jazz that evolved during the twentieth century. It has a slow, swinging beat, and can express sadness, worry or uncertainty.

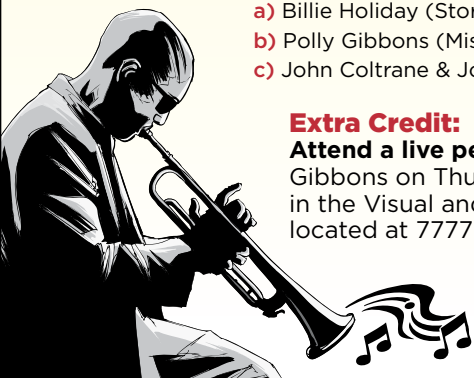
- a) In what year was the oldest article about Jazz published in The Oklahoman?
