It's time for young Oklahomans to start their annual reading adventure!

Students in grades three through twelve read from the appropriate Sequoyah masterlist of nominees and then vote next February and March for their favorite book.

The nation's third-oldest youth-choice literary award has honored books from *Old Yeller*—the first winner in 1959—to *The Hunger Games*—the world-wide phenomenon that won in 2011.
